

André Terrel Jackson presents Reverence a live reading of three poems, Candied Yams, Rituals, and Blackberries from their chapbook, Existing Fully Is A Revolutionary Act. The chapbook is a small exploration of personal narrative through autobiographic reflections, self portraits and poetry explore gender, race and sexuality. All poems explore queerness and power.

Interested in the individual experiences that add up to create social, political and cultural groups, André mines personal history, using poetry, weaving, sculpture, apparel and performance to spark conversation about difficult issues related to identity. Armando Lopez-Bircann presents FemNomNomNom, a mixed reality cabaret performance featuring Arma Dura in digital and physical wearables designed with a genderfluid lens. This performance is a call to adventure with armors made of ribbons.

Lopez-Bircann is a Latinx artist that engineers wearable sculptures, digital media and performances. Their practice is framed by immigrant narratives, genderfluid expression and digital native sensibilities. They design works in collaboration with dancers, circus performers, photographers, videographers, musicians and other artists. Currently living in Washington DC, Lopez-Bircann

Felicita Felli Maynard presents Primp, a re-imagination of gueer life in the early 20th century celebrating radical queer communities existing pre-Stonewall, while also giving a specific focus to how that looks in and out of the archive. Maynard offers space for these imagined queer ancestors to exist and honor the lives of what could have been, while also respecting the name and likeness of those queer ancestors who wanted that part of their lives to remain private. This work is a remix of the past in order to envision an inclusive future.

Maynard is a first generation Afrolatinx gendergueer interdisciplinary artist & educator. They use analog and alternative photography to explore their identity as a queer, gender non-conforming descendant of the African diaspora. https://www.photofelli.com/ Image Credit: Felli Maynard

Buzz Slutzky presents Clothes Feelings, a live performance exploring themes on clothes and gender, quarantine, body feelings, targeted ads, and health concerns/TMI.

Slutzky is a non-binary transgender and white Ashkenazi Jewish artist, illustrator, filmmaker, educator, and performer. Their multidisciplinary art practice incorporates drawing, painting, sculpture, installation, and video. Their autobiographical and research-based practices build upon trans, queer, feminist, and leftist Jewish cultural traditions with an often humorous and frank voice. Juh Weems presents *black pleasure, play and rest as radical.* "While the pedagogical manuals" attributed the hardships of freedom to idleness", infantilism"**, and intemperance"*** or contrasted the burden of independence with the ease of slavery, the emancipated identified the sources of adversity as their lack of resources, the government's unwillingness to provide reparations, the pervasiveness of white violence, and the failure of the law to protect black lives." - Saidiya V. Hartman, Scenes of Subjection, 1997

black play, pleasure and rest are radical is an auto-ethnographic video work comprised of various repurposed works, talks and recordings created by fatblackclit.

fatblackclit/janae/juh weems is black. nigga, more specifically. which is to say, janae is all things. anything. everything. necessarily. niggas become all things needed to thrive in each next moment that niggas create. weems is black, is nigga, is fat, is femme in this one body meaning inherently queer, inherently trans, inherently kinky. a freak. meaning always playing. meaning always recreating self as a means of ensuring existence in the future.

janae is a nigga, which is to say at the heart of janae's work is the irreverent, holy groundedness of improvisation, self-destruction and re-creation, embodiment of many generations of shapeshifting black femmes and dykes and gender-suspicious, genre-fucking beings before, behind and between.

juh works to unsettle the mess of who we (niggas) are. exhumes the dirt of when and how we are. and works to understand how we can craft more expansive space to be who we are. to be free.

janae is the co-organizer of DC-based Black Femme Brunch, the co-host of WRSHP (We Really Shouldn't Have a Podcast), a podcast about how two fat, black, queer, churchy ass niggas navigate their healing. janae is also a cohort of the Halcyon Arts Lab Fellow cohort 3. Image Credit: Juh Weems
